

With more than 2.1 million acres of public land for your outdoor recreation. While you experience the solar eclipse you will be able to enjoy the most beautiful scenery of the National Forest system. You have the opportunity to see wildlife, beautiful scenery and our local communities are ready to serve you.



## What is a Total Solar Eclipse?

An astronomical event when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, and the Moon fully blocks the Sun.

You can only see the complete eclipse within the lines of totality. The centerline is where the longest duration can be seen.

#### Leave No Trace: Outdoor Ethics

- 1. Plan ahead and prepare
- 2. Travel and camp on durable spaces
- 3. Dispose of waste properly
- 4. Leave what you find
- 5. Minimize campfire impacts
- 6. Respect wildlife
- 7. Be considerate of other visitors



## **Vehicle Travel**

- Drive on roads designated on the Motor Vehicle Use Map only.
- Do not block traffic, roads must be passable to other vehicles.
- Be alert to wildlife on roadways, especially at dusk and at night.
- Allow yourself extra time due to traffic
- MVUM (motor vehicle use maps) are available online or the Avenza App.
- GPS is **NOT** always reliable, cell phone

Pack it in, pack it out!

- Dumpsters will be staged at certain locations.
- Make sure to store it so bears can't get it.

**Bathroom** Deposit solid human waste in catholes dug 6 to 8 inches deep, at least 200 feet from water, camp and trails. Cover and disguise the cathole when finished.

• Pack out toilet paper and hygiene products.

#### Eye Safety

- Don't forget to pick up a pair of eclipse glasses before heading into the backcountry.
- You'll need them to view the eclipse safely!
